RESOLVED : That in the opinion of the Advisory Board and the Commis-sioner of Health a person who has had the operation for vaccination faithfulthe operation for vaccination faithful-ly performed three times, at intervals of two successive weeks, without suc-cess is for the time being immune from smallpox. and, further, that un-der the present law persons who have a written cretificate from a reputable physician that two such attempts to vaccinate were faithfully performed and a second certificate from a phy-sician of the State Department of Health, or fa Board or Burean of Health, or fa Board or Burean of Health, or of a Board or Burean of Health, or one year without violating the spirit of the law, the object of which is simply to prevent the spread of smallpox.
