The engineer in question is Professor Walker, of State College, who will come to Danville as the representative of Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, State com-missioner of health. He will arrive on the 10:19 Pennsylvania train and proceed at once to look over the town. Professor Walker yesterday notified Borough secretary H. B. Patton of his intended visit and Mr. Patton in turn notified the committee on sewers, who will be on hand to meet the engineer.

Owing to the long silence maintained following the application for per-mission to extend the sewer on West Mahoning street council was beginning to think that the whole matter would be ignored by the State department of health. However, now that Dr. Dixon has gone so far as to send a representative here to study the situation at close range no one needs to despair. There is no doubt but that a study of conditions on West Mahoning street will convince the visiting engineer that a sewer extension is very much needed there. It would not be at all surprising if the permission to extend the sewer were granted.
