SCARLET DRAWS SKETCH OF CASE

HARRISBURG, May 13. The presentation of the state's case to the jury in the second of the trials for alleged "grafting" in the furnishing of the new capitol, with Congressman H. Burd Cassel, Architect Joseph M. Houshou, and Shumaker, Snyder, Matine and Irvine, former state officials, as defendants, was made today by James Scarlet, special counsel for the commonwealth.

SCARLET'S ARRANGEMENT. The strongest point made by Scarlet was that while there is no direct evidence of an agreement among the defendants, the facts and circumstances to be brought out in testimony clearly prove the commission of a deed amounting to a conspiracy to defraud the state.

PROOF OF CONSPIRACY. He also alleged that charges had been made for heavy metallic furniture only, when they should have been for both heavy and light furniture. STATESMEN GATHER AT WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, May 31. The White House was the scene today of the assemblage of many of the most distinguished figures in the political and industrial life of the nation.

The occasion was the conference of President Roosevelt with the Governors of nearly all the States and Territories to consider the broad question of conservation of the country's natural resources. The conference will continue through Friday.

GOVERNMENT REPRESENTED. The men who know how the natural resources of the country have been wasted—captains of industry who have dealt with the resources and experts who have studied the conditions—told of the nation's prodigality in the exploitation and consumption of its natural resources. The conference is the outgrowth of the recommendation of the Inland Waterways convention to President Roosevelt. The idea of such a gathering met with the President's enthusiastic approval.

GREAT CROPS ARE PROMISED

The government crop report of last week ought to give the country a great business impetus, and encourage capital to invest, for the outlook is exceedingly encouraging. The winter killed wheat is smaller, the area under cultivation broader, and the condition higher, and these three conditions at the same time have never been known to exist heretofore.

The government report places winter wheat at 89, compared with 91.3 on April 1 last, 83.9 on May 1, 1907. The figure is above the average for the past ten years at this season. The acreage abandoned during the winter was somewhat heavier than expected, but the area left is 1,620,000 acres above that in winter wheat a year ago, and the indicated yield is some 56,000,000 bushels greater. On the whole the report is satisfactory, showing as it does that the crop has passed through a very critical month without as much damage as usually occurs, emerging in good condition to withstand warm weather, thanks to the rootgrowth promoted by the long moist spell.

The average condition of the rye crop on May 1 was 90.3 per cent. of a normal, as compared with 89.1 per cent. on April 1, 88 per cent. on May 1, 1907, and 89.5 per cent. the mean of the May 1 averages of the past ten years. The average condition of meadow hay lands on May 1 was 93.5 per cent. of a normal, as compared with 88.6 on May 1, 1907, and 89.5 the mean of the average on May 1 of the past ten years. The average condition of pastures on May 1 was 92.6 per cent. of a normal, as compared with 79.6 on May 1, 1907, and 87.8 as the mean of the average on May 1 of the past ten years.

Of spring planting, 54.7 per cent. is reported as having been completed on May 1, compared with 47 per cent. on May 1, 1907, and 52.6 per cent. on May 1, 1906. From last week's percentage and acreage the produce exchange statistician figures a crop of 428,414,000 bushels, against 410,110,000 on the 1st of April, according to the new method of estimating introduced on the exchange this year, which takes account of the five-year average course of the crop between the early government reports and harvest. By the method of estimating the harvest in force last year the crop of winter wheat this season should be 461,141,000 bushels, against 405,101,000 on April 1 by the old method.

At this time last year wheat advanced 3 cents in a single day, and there was talk of dollar wheat, because the government report announced the abandonment of 3,533,000 acres of winter-killed plant. This year the abandoned area is only 1,315,000 acres, and the condition is 6 per cent. better. As there is considerable unemployed labor this year, there will not be the usual trouble to secure help to gather the crop, the harvesting of winter wheat beginning within a month, and with two months, the crop of 1908 will be garnered.
