SIGNS OF RETURN-ING PROSPERITY

Conditions throughout the county point to an early return of prosperity. Bank clearings and railroad earnings are below those of a year ago, but the gap is steadily narrowing. There are fewer idle cars than there were at the beginning of June. The July interest and dividend payments this year in New York, the country's financial centre, will be \$177,000,000, as compared with \$184,000,000 in July, 1907. Thus the falling off is far less than had been expected. About \$46,000, of gold has been exported since the present outward movement began in the middle of April, but as we gained over \$100,000,000 of gold in November and December last, and as we can get as much as we need from the outside world at any time we may need it, this movement does not disturb anybody. The rates for money are about the same as they are in mid-summer of normal years. "Re-employment days" are becoming general. St. Louis had one on June first when 15,-000 idle persons were put to work. On a far larger scale the Pittsburg district had one on July sixth, when every plant of the United States Steel corporation, the largest concern in the world in its field, resumed operations. The other shops of that corporation, all over the country, will, it is expected, all be running by August first.
