

TO REPEAL TWO CENT RATE LAW

One of the most important bills to be introduced in the next session of Goals: Hickey 4, W. McVey 1, Mc. the legislature will be one providing Dermott 10, J. McVey 5, Englehart 1, for the repeal of the two cent fare act. The railroads of the State, which are still forced to comply with this act, fouls: W. Deimer 4, Wm. McVey 1. have combined in a movement to Referee Ainsworth. Time of halves 20 bring about the repeal of the act and sentiment is reported so strong throughout the State as to forecast the repeal of the act without much opposition. The Pennsylvania railroad had the act declared unconstitutional but this decision affects that road alone. Those who are supporting the repeal bill say that the enforcement of the measure has worked to the disadvantage and financial loss not only to railroad interests, but to business in communities where the smaller roads have taken off many of the passenger trains. It is also pointed out that the act has been declared unconstitutional as regards the Pennsylvania system proper and that the continued enforce ment of the act makes it special leg islation and that on its face makes the law clearly unconstitutional. The Reading road still adheres to the two cent fare and the Northern Central. which is really a branch of the Pennsylvania, also gives the two cent rate The case won by the Pennsylvania Railroad company which made the law unconstitutional, was won by that railroad alone and the ruling effects none of its tributaries.
