IN THE KITCHEN.

Onion Cake.—Peel five or six large onions, cut in halves and boil fifteen minutes. Drain and chop fine, adding a small lump of butter. Beat two eggs and mix with them four tablespoonfuls of cold mashed potato, two or three tablespoonfuls of chopped ham, about a teaspoonful of caraway seed and a cup of milk. Mix in the chopped onion and season to taste with salt and pepper. Butter a large, shallow tin. Line with a good short paste, spread the mixture over it and bake in a brisk oven. When cooked, lift out of the tin, put on a hot dish on a paper doily or folded napkin and serve hot.
