DANVILLE MAY SELL WATER

NEW LABOR CERTIFICATES

The following section of a new law goes into effect January 1st, and should be read by parents and employers of child labor:

Section 8. The employment certificate required by the provisions of this act shall be issued as follows:

In school districts having a district superintendent or supervising principal, by such superintendent or supervising principal; in school districts having no superintendent or supervising principal, by the secretary of the board of school directors for that district; Provided, That any district superintendent, supervising principal, principal of schools, or secretary of the board of school directors, hereby directed to issue such certificates, may authorize and deputize in writing, such persons as they may see proper to act in their place and stand for the purpose of issuing such certificates.

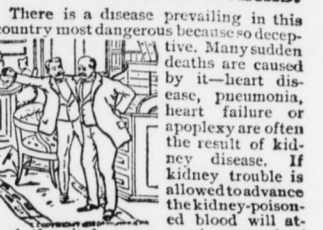
