NEW LABOR **CERTIFICATES**

The following section of a new law goes into effect January 1st, and should be read by parents and employers of child labor:

Section 8. The employment certificate required by the provisions of this act shall be issued as follows: In school districts having a district superintendent or supervising principal; in school districts having no superintendent or supervising principal; in school districts having no superintendent or supervising principal, but having one or more principals of schools, by such principals, each principal to issue the certificate to minors residing within the territory belonging to the school over which he has supervision; in school districts, or parts of districts, having odistrict superintendent or principal, by the secretary of the board of schools, or secretary of the board of school directors, hereby directed to issue such certificates, may authorize and deputize in writing, such persons as they may see proper to act in their place and stead for the purpose of issuing such certificates.
