1909 DONATIONS BROKE RECORDS

Table titled 'Leading Public Benefactions During 1909 and the Donors:' listing names and amounts.

The statistics of gifts for the benefit of humanity as compiled by the Chicago 'Tribune' for 1909 shows the greatest giving ever.

The year 1909 has been characterized by extraordinary beneficence, the total donations and bequests amounting to \$150,441,353.

The largest amount of gifts heretofore were made in 1907, with an amount slightly in excess of \$140,000,000.

In the life tragedies of the year there shows a small decrease over 1908, the number being 10,330 as compared with 10,532.

The significant feature of the above figures is the large increase of those who commit suicide because of ill health.

The number of legal executions, which for a few years past has been decreasing, shows an increase, being 167 as compared with 92 in 1908.

The number of lynchings in 1909 was 87, a falling off of 13 as compared with 1908.

The number of deaths by all kinds of personal violence in 1909, except suicides and lynchings, as reported by telegraph and recorded in the various States and Territories, was 8,103.

A significant feature of these figures is the increase of murders by highway men and thugs, being 185 more than in 1908.

On the innumerable base ball fields 30 were killed in 1909, and 74 seriously injured.

By automobile accidents 562 persons have been killed and 2,552 seriously injured during the year.

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Mrs. Robert G. Miller died suddenly at the family homestead, Ferry street, Sunday afternoon.

The deceased had been indisposed for three days prior to her death, but, although a physician was in attendance, her condition was not considered at all grave.

Mrs. Miller was aged 69 years, 9 months and 18 days. She was a member of the Mahoning Presbyterian church and was a most highly esteemed woman.

She is survived by her husband, three sons—Dr. Warren J. and Charles S. Miller, of Philadelphia and Samuel K. of Danville—two daughters—Miss Jennie, who resides at home and Miss Catherine, of Asbury Park, N. J.

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DANVILLE AND PITTSSTON DRAW

The two games of basket ball between the strong Pittsston five and the newly organized Danville team on New Year's day proved to be 'corkers.'

The afternoon game opened with Pittsston taking Danville by surprise with their fine team work and the first half ended with the visitors in the lead by a score of 21 to 6.

The evening game was remarkable for its clean, fast play. Neither side scored a point from fouls and as a result the play was continuous, and had the spectators on edge at all times.

Every member of the home team played a great game. The defensive work of the guards, especially in keeping the fast Pittsston forwards from scoring more than 22 points, is remarkable.

The showing on New Year's day against one of the fastest teams in this section is proof of what Danville may expect from the new team after they have been playing together for a few games.

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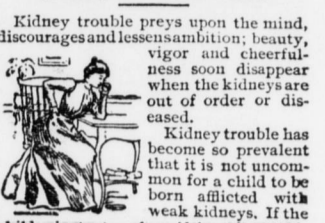
