

Part of a Pennsylvanian Fown Drops Into a

Mine. A disastrous cave-in of the earth's surface occurred on Friday afternou in the town of Plains, near Wilkesbarre. The affected parts covered an area of 130 square yards and is situated in the slope of a hill. The beautiful Catholic church of the Sacred Heart stands tight in the middle of the caved-in portion. Adjoining it is the residence of the pastor, Father Phillips; to the south is another building, the home of the sisters of charity; on the opposite side are the residences of Heury Masters and Evan Evans. About four o'clock the crash came. first the earth seemed to sink gradually and then there was a collapse. A report rent the air, which was heard for miles People ran out of their houses, thinking it was an earthquake.
Father Phillips was in the library when

the report came. He was thrown from his chair and the bookcase toppled over on him. He was slightly injured. When the priest recovered from his fright he found that the front portion of his residdnce was ten feet in the ground and liable to drop into the mine at any moment He rushed up stairs to his mother's room only to find that the old lady had been thrown out of her bed. She is an invalid. It was with difficulty that she was taken out of the house. Dishes were thrown off the tables and the plastering on all the rooms was knocked off. The house is a omplete wreck. Loss, \$10,000.

Some plumbers were at work in the church when the cave-in took place. Their first intimation of danger was the falling of the plaster in huge blocks. George Keller was struck by a falling beam from the belfry and seriously hurt. The church is past repair. The front part is down nine feet.
