Horible Death of twe Men and the Serious Injury of Another.

Another was taken to Conemaugh and was supposed to be a man named Coleman. His residence is not known. The third victim whose name is unknown and who was seriously hurt, was taken to Conemaugh.

Utzler, a brakeman on a Pennsylvania Railread train said he saw the three men walking on the north track about ten minutes before the accident, but this was the last seen of them until after they were struck. 
