Not a Question of Politics.

Under the above caption the Democrat-
ic New York Sun says:

"We regret to notice that some of our
Democratic contemporaries are treating
the Homestead incident in a partisan
fashion, for which there is no excuse.
They assume that because Mr. Andrew
Carnegie and his associates at Homestead
have been engaged in an industry pro-
tected by the tariff, and because a dispute
as to wages has arisen between the em-
ployers and employed, protection is re-
sponsible for the Homestead murders
and mischiefs. In Congress, too, certain
persons who suppose themselves to be
Democrats have insisted upon this view.
If strikes were never heard of in un-
protected industries, if, in fact, the great-
est strikes in the country had not occur-
ed in unprotected industries like the
steam railroads and the horse railroads,
if free trade England were not a country
of strikes and if all these facts were not
known to everybody with education
enough to read large print, these assump-
tions might be worth contradicting. As
the case is, they are so far fetched and
wildly absurd that we fear they will bring
discredit upon the Democrats in the na-
tional campaign.

This is not a question of partisan pol-
itics; it is deeper than that, for it goes to
the very heart of social order and the
preservation of all that has been won for
civilization. The Democratic politicians
and the newspapers that are trying to
obscure the real questions are doing all
in their power to injure the Democratic
party."

TWO OF A KIND.

The Congress shall have power to lay
and collect taxes, duties and excises for
revenue only necessary to pay debts, pro-
vide for the common defense and carry
on the Government of the Confederate
States; but no bounties shall be granted
from the treasury; nor shall any duties
or taxes on importations from foreign na-
tions be laid to promote or foster any
branch of industry.—Article I of Confed-
erate Constitution, Adopted March 11,
1861.

We denounce the Republican Protec-
tion as a fraud; a robbery of the great
majority of the American people for the
benefit of the few. We declare it to be a
fundamental principle of the Democratic
party that the Federal Government has
no constitutional power to impose and
collect Tariff duties, except for the pur-
pose of revenue only, and we demand
that the collection of such taxes shall be
limited to the necessities of the Govern-
ment when honestly and economically
administered.—From Tariff Plank of the
Democratic Platform, Adopted at Chic-
ago, June 22, 1892.

THREE OF A KIND.

Whereas, it is necessary for the sup-
port of the Government, for the discharge
of the debt of the United States, and for
the encouragement and protection of
manufactures, that duties be laid on im-
ported goods, &c.—From Preamble of
First Tariff Act, signed by George Wash-
ington, July 4, 1789.

THREE OF A KIND.

Congress has repeatedly and not with-
out success directed its attention to the
encouragement of manufactures. The
object is of too much consequence not
to insure a continuance of its efforts in
every way which shall appear eligible.—
From George Washington's speech to
Congress, dated December 7, 1796.

We believe that all articles which can-
not be produced in the United States, ex-
cept luxuries, should be admitted free of
duty, and that on all imports coming into
competition with the products of Ameri-
can labor there should be levied duties
equal to the difference between wages
abroad and at home.—From Republican
Platform, Adopted at Minneapolis, June
10, 1892.
