ON the last day of the Fifty-second Congress there was a stroke of economy for which the Democratic House is entitled to special credit. It was the passage of a joint resolution giving to each member of the House of Representatives a clerk, or private secretary at a salary of \$100 a month. This takes effect on and after April 1, 1893. It means an expenditure of \$35,300 a month, for clerk hire or no less than \$300,000 during a long session. And what will these clerks do? Chiefly attend to private correspondence, three-fourths of which will relate to wretched pulling for re-nomination. The public not only pays the freight on this business, but will henceforth pay the men who put up the packages.—Oakland Republican.

UNDER date of March 4, John W. Church, of W. Va., addressed the following letter to Congressman Capahart: "I am the postmaster at Barboursville, W. Va. I am a Republican. I am an offensive partisan. To-day Grover Cleveland, Democrat, succeeds Benjamin Harrison, Republican, as President of the United States, and all office-holders should now agree in sentiment with the former. To the victors belong the spoils. On your recommendation our longing successors will be appointed. A condition of 'innocuous desuetude' is preferable to that of a fourth class postoffice, and I hereby tender my resignation, to take effect as soon as practicable. Turn the rascals out!"
