BELOW are so many of the game laws of the new administration as have been translated from the original Greek manu-

scripts of Secretary of State Gresham:

Federal appointments may be hunted, by Democrats only, any time during the next four years, either with gun, hook, net, bludgeon or dynamite.

Voters may be trapped any time before election.

It is not lawful to hunt worms except the four weeks preceding a State or National election.

Candidates cannot fish for voters with hooks baited with silver dollars or pint bottles, any more.

It is unlawful to aim at two offices at once. For instance, if a man fails to bring down the Postmaster Generalship of his town, he is liable to arrest if he turns the other barrel on the Trustee's office.

Any office hunter caught baiting his trap with religion is liable to a fine and imprisonment for life.

Politicians who attempt to catch newspapers with promises of appointments are amenable to that provision of the game law which forbids cruelty to animals.

Office hunters are forbidden to trap, snare, net, hook, shoot or otherwise seek to capture an office when they have not been in a party which they have just joined, six months.

The signatures of voters on petitions may be trapped any way, anywhere and at any time.

Voters cannot be trapped within fifty feet of the polls.

Other provisions of the game law bearing upon the time and manner in which offices and voters may be hunted and trapped, have not yet been translated.—Ex.

The Murder of John P. Reed.

Having received the particulars of the murder of John P. Reed, which we mentioned in our issue of last week, we will give the details of the crime to our readers, as reported to THE STAR by a prominent citizen of Eagle, Fayette county, W. Va., near which place the crime was committed. As stated in last week's STAR, Mr. Reed was a late citizen of Boynton, moving from there to Minersville, Ohio, and from thence to Eagle, W. Va. Mr. Reed lived at Boynton less than a year ago; he had a family, but we do not know how many there were in the family, more than that there were several small children of tender age. Our informant gives us the particulars, as follows:

EAGLE, W. VA., April 7th, 1893.

EDITOR SOMERSET COUNTY STAR.—Referring to yours of the 6th inst., will state that John P. Reed came here from Minersville, Ohio, and went to work for our neighbors, the St. Clair Co. While appearing to be a very quiet, orderly fellow himself, he took up and affiliated with a low tribe, the Esteps, who when in liquor are of a nature to raise a quarrel and are too much cut to do any fighting themselves.

On Sunday, Feb. 28th, the day following pay day, John Reed, in company with James Estep, went down to the neighboring town of Montgomery, two miles away, and got very drunk, and while there became engaged in some quarrel with another crowd. After they had started up the C. & O. track, homeward, I met them, and they were then disposed to be quarrelsome. It is supposed that the crowd from Montgomery boarded a shifting freight train and overtook them at Edgewater, about half way between here and there, and Reed was struck on the head with some heavy implement (probably a coupling pin) by one Walter Dent, who has so far eluded capture.
