THE U.S. FLAG ORDERED DOWN

IT NO LONGER WAVES O'ER

Honolulu and the Protectorate is Declared Off.

On Commissioner Blount's arrival at Honolulu he ordered the American flag, which for two months has floated over the government buildings, hauled down and the United States cruiser Boston's forces sent aboard. A crowd of 2,000 saw them go. There was consternation among the American party and rejoicing among the royalists. Blount is a good questioner, but gives little information. Minister Stevens had less than twenty-four hours' notice of what was done.

The chief apprehension here is Japanese interference, and it is feared the queen may appeal to the captain of the Japanese cruiser. Commissioner Blount, Minister Stevens and Admiral Skerrett have agreed. It is stated that Japanese interference would be an act of hostility to the United States, and will act accordingly in an emergency. The Japanese consul and the commander of the cruiser deny any hostile intentions. The officers of the Japanese cruiser called on Admiral Skerrett a few days ago and assured him no hostile intentions were entertained. "The admiral responded good naturedly but dryly, and invited the attention of his visitors to official data containing a comparative statement of the power of the guns of the Naniwa and Boston, nonchalantly remarking as was said by another naval officer on some similar occasion, "that the United States is making some of the best guns in the world."

The consul stated positively that neither he nor any attaché of the consulate had received any overtures from the queen, though he admitted he suspected the deposed sovereign had leanings towards Japanese assistance. Commissioner Blount has been receiving much attention from Hawaiian residents, who are frequent callers upon him. The provisional government has been notified that the American protectorate will be declared off May 1 on the ground that it is not necessary and is incompatible with any diplomatic negotiations that might be arranged between the two countries. The United States, however, would brook no hostile interference in Hawaiian affairs by any foreign power. The provisional government is consequently preparing to order out its force to maintain peace and order.

The scene at the hauling down of the flag was dramatic in its very quietness. The provisional government forces and the royalist government were present, and throngs of natives, Chinese, Japanese, whites and half-castes on foot and horseback. At the sound of the bugle call blown by Lieut. Draper the flag was drawn down by unseen hands and the Hawaiian flag run up over the government buildings. Previously Commissioner Blount had answered the address of a delegation from the Annexation club in these words: "Gentlemen, you will very readily understand that I can make no reply to this address. My negotiations will be conducted entirely with your government."

BLOUNT CONFIRMS THE NEWS. United States Commissioner Blount's dispatches from Honolulu were received Saturday by Secretary Gresham at Washington. Mr. Blount confirms the reports from San Francisco that he had ordered down the American flag and that the marines had been relieved from duty on shore and returned to the warship Boston. While explaining in full the reasons for his action, he says that he found everything quiet there, and that the majority of the people seemed to think that there was no necessity for a United States protectorate. Secretary Gresham said that he expected to receive full details from Mr. Blount next week.

THE LABOR WORLD.

IRON moulders have 377 unions. CHICAGO, Ill., has 30,000 unemployed. AMERICA has had 12,093 strikes since 1874. CANADIAN sailors are settling in Buffalo, N. Y. QUEBECERS 23,174 miners in the National Union. GREENSLAND, Australia, has 11,551 unemployed. BOSTON (Mass.) coalers have \$700 in the benefit fund. LOS ANGELES unions run a free employment bureau. KREPP, the German iron founder, employs 25,000 men. FRANCE'S 267 strikes last year involved 108,000 workmen. THE organizers of clerks of this country have many unions at present. A LARGE number of whom are still employed in underground mines in Idaho. The American Railway Union was permanently organized the other day in Chicago. SCANDINAVIAN sailors are said to predominate on vessels of nearly all nationalities. WHITE phosphorus is destroying the facial bones of London girls in match factories. SYDNEY, Australia, has appointed a committee to find the reason for a series of unemployed. AUBURN, Me., has 31,000 shoe workers. They make from \$15 to \$20 a week and want an advance. In South Africa the Servant Girls' Union recruits mistresses to furnish references from their last girls. TILE-MAKING employs 20,000 men at Sojaumont-Lippe. They get \$13 for six months' work. ABOUT 3,000 brickworkers leave Canada for the United States every spring and return to their homes in the autumn. The Pennsylvania Railroad employs 54,827 men, according to its report to the Pennsylvania Secretary of Internal Affairs. The Reading Railroad has 23,715 hands. CO-OPERATION has been successfully entered into by the locked out granite cutters, about 500 of whom are working in thirteen quarries in the State of Maine, when they leased for \$100 five months ago. Since then they have sold stones valued at \$97,237. LIBERTY DAWN ASSOCIATION OF HACE DRIVERS, at a recent meeting held in New York City, to protest against the order of lively stable keepers that they must shave off their whiskers, were assured of the sympathy and support of the waiters, who have been ordered by hotel keepers to cut off their mustaches.
