Our March to Gettysburg

CHAMBERSBURG Pa., June 11th, 1893. We left our old camping ground in the vicinity of White Oak Church, on the 11th of June. 1863, just 30 years ago today, and took up our line of march for one knew where we were going and what we were going to do. Our leaders knew that old Bob Lee was on the move, but where he was going no one could tell. We had to depend on our cavalry to find out where the enemy was going, and they did good service. Prior to this our cavalry was of very little use to the army of the Potomac, being distributed in com-panies and squadrons, and at most a regiment, here and there, when attacked would, as a rule, retreat on account of the superior numbers brought to bear against them. When Hooker took command of the army, there was a general consolidation and reorganization of infantry and cavalry. The cavalry was or ganized into brigades, divisions and corps. The infantry corps were num bered and wore badges to designate their number. Our corps (the 6th) was the Greek cross, and each division had a different color—red, white and blue—1st, 2nd and 3d, and if we got away from our

Furturately for us all, there was a halt, and we rested about two hours. It was a very monotonous campaign, so far; nothing to excite us whatever; not even through that barren country.
