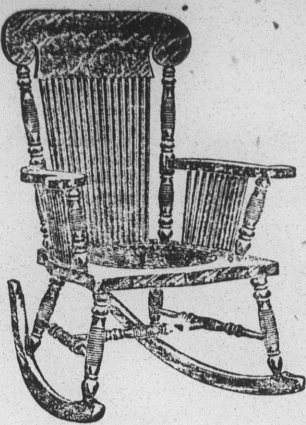

Extracts from Sermons on Various Topics.
