WATCH THE LEGISLATURE.

Keep in Touch With Your Members and Ask Them to Vote Against Quay.

SOME PLANS TO RE-ELECT HIM.

William Livesey, Ex-State Treasurer, Asked to Come Home and Tell What He Knows—The Return of Marsh. Men Will Not Be Bought and Sold Like Cattle at the Next Legislature in Harrisburg.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
Harrisburg, Nov. 8.—By the time this letter reaches its thousands of readers the election will have been held and the next governor of Pennsylvania will have been chosen. The same ballot which elects the governor also chooses the legislator, and it is to be hoped that no citizen of Pennsylvania will have cause to regret his action of today.

The vital point in the campaign now at an end has been the legislature. It has not been the question of a governor so much as it has been the question of who shall succeed M. S. Quay in the senate of the United States. This is the paramount issue, and one which it is believed will be solved against Senator Quay.

The choice of a legislature at any time is a matter of vital importance to the citizens of the state.

IMPORTANCE OF THE LEGISLATURE.

The legislature makes the laws, whether good or evil, and its hand is all powerful in shaping the destiny of a party. The present political revolution in this state is almost solely due to the abusive power as exhibited in the legislature of 1897. It was a Quay owned body. Whenever the senior senator piped the legislature danced. And it was this shameful exhibition of arbitrary power that the people resented. The force of the rebellion within the party was directed against Senator Quay alone. Incidentally the men who were the tools of his power as candidates suffered with their master.

If the Quay forces win this fall it will be solely because of the inability of the people to battle with the power and resources of Senator Quay, the trusts and the corporations. The heart of the people is steeled against Quay and Quayism.

AN OFFICE WITH A BRAND ON IT.

If Senator Quay again reaches the senate chamber it will be by the use of a power that will forever after heap contumely on the office. He will have to accept the senatorship with a fire mark branded upon it, which all eyes of the future will not be able to efface. There is every reason to believe that the next legislature will be anti-Quay Republican. That an anti-Quay Republican, and not a Democrat, will be sent to the United States senate. There is no danger that a Democrat will succeed Quay.

If the legislature is anti-Quay, then the only power within reach by which Senator Quay can hope to receive the nomination will be at Democratic hands.

But there is little chance of the legislature being anything else than anti-Quay. The great wave of indignation that has swept over the state and dashed itself at the feet of Senator Quay and the machine bears on its bosom the wreck of scores of Quay heaters' ambitions. Their places will be taken by men, as a rule, who can neither be bought, bribed or cajoled.

WRITE TO YOUR LEGISLATOR.

As soon as the result is known this week the thing for every right minded citizen to do will be to ascertain who the newly elected member of the legislature is from his county, and then write him immediately with the statement that Senator Quay's re-election would mean financial loss to the workmen of the state and a distinct gain for the trusts, syndicates and corporations. The representative should be urged to vote against Senator Quay's re-election in the legislature.

There is a great deal more in this method of procedure than appears on the surface. A number of men have been elected to the legislature today who not only are not machine men, but who are anti-Quay men. Many of them have not made up their minds just how they will vote, and it will require vigorous protests perhaps to persuade them to vote against M. S. Quay.

The great fight from this on will be in the legislature. Here the battle for the Quay succession must be fought. Already everything is being done that can be done, in advance, to secure Senator Quay's re-election. But much remains to be accomplished. It is no betrayal of confidence to say that no efforts will be spared to bring to justice men who may forget their obligations to their constituents and their solemn oaths to do what is upright. It will not be possible to buy and sell men like cattle this year. This is the feeling that animates the reformers of the country and of this state, irrespective of party.

THE RETURN OF MARSH.

Of course, anything that might be said concerning today's election in the state would be little better than guessing. There is more trouble in store for the state treasury ere long, I think. On last Saturday night Mr. Wanamaker appealed to William Livesey, ex-state treasurer and ex-state treasury cashier, to come out from his hiding and tell the truth. On Friday last a tired, unshaven man appeared in Philadelphia and gave himself up to the officers of the law. It was Gideon C. Marsh, the defaulting president of the Keystone bank. Mr. Wanamaker's address at the Academy of Music meeting two weeks ago, in which he offered to help Marsh and his family, reached the latter away up in the state of Washington, and he returned. Now Mr. Wanamaker is anxious to have Livesey return and tell all he knows. His appearance here would produce a profound sensation. It would assist in clearing up old mysteries of the state treasury. By all means let it come, and let us see it usher in an anti-Quay legislature.
