QUAY'S CASE DESPERATE.

His Agents Are Trying to Fix Up Contests to Oust Anti-Quay Members.

AFTER ANTI-QUAY DEMOCRATS, TOO.

It is Given Out That the Senator Can Figure Out One of a Majority Against All Combinations. The Attempt to Fix Up Contests in Schuylkill—Failure of the Scheme in Chester County.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
Harrisburg, Nov. 29.—The public is only awaking to a perfect realization of what the anti-Quay forces were really aiming at in the late campaign. The election of Colonel W. A. Stone as governor was heralded abroad as a great Quay triumph, and a victory over the anti-Quay forces. It was a Quay victory, but the great anti-Quay victory was in the work of electing a legislature that would defeat Senator Quay for return to Washington.

QUAY IS DEFEATED.
Senator Quay is defeated. On reliable authority it can be said that Senator Quay has reached a point where he can figure out, as he claims, one of a majority against any combination. This shows that Senator Quay himself even admits the almost hopelessness of his fight. The fact is that Senator Quay cannot figure out a majority. A combination between the Democrats and the anti-Quay Republicans will defeat him absolutely. And it will be by a substantial majority.

In the hope of securing Democratic aid the agents of Senator Quay are working night and day among the Democratic members-elect of the next legislature to induce them to keep out of a fusion movement.

AFRAID OF FUSION.
Senator Quay and his friends dread a fusion movement because it means death to their schemes. For the purpose of defeating any such thing they are encouraging the Democrats to bring out various prominent men over the state as Democratic candidates for the United States senate. They hope by this to create dissension. But even this will not work.

One of the best known politicians in the state, a Quay follower and in his employ, is engaged in the work of preparing contests in various counties over the state against Democrats and anti-Quay Republicans. The contestants, of course, are Quay men who were defeated in the late election. The plan is to carry these contests into the house of representatives, and with the aid of a solid Quay delegation and as many others as can be picked up by devious ways, seat some of the Quay men. This is the scheme that is being worked in Schuylkill county, where the most vigorous efforts are being put forth to induce the Quay candidates, who were defeated at the last election, to contest the seats of their successful opponents.

A STRANGE FEATURE.
The strange feature is presented in this of the Quay agents in one county setting up contests to oust Democrats, while in other counties they are doing everything possible to secure Democratic votes for Senator Quay. But there need be no fear about the Democrats' opposition to Quay; it is bitter and lasting.

One contest that had been fully decided upon was to come from Chester county. The regular ring ticket was defeated by a ticket composed of two Democrats and two anti-Quay Republicans. The Quay machine had fully decided to get up a contest and carry it to Harrisburg. It was given out that D. Smith Taibot, one of the defeated Quay candidates, would carry the contest through. Last week it was discovered that public opinion was so strong in Chester county against such a movement that it would be dangerous to put it through. The matter was dropped, and there will be no contest from this county at Harrisburg this winter.

DEALS NOT MADE.
One other point in the skirmish for place in the next legislature is the attempt of the Quay machine to create the impression that deals have been made with people all over the state which will insure Senator Quay's ultimate victory. Announcement has been made, without the slightest authority, that Quay deals have been arranged with Senator Magee, Secretary of the Commonwealth David Martin and with Senator Flynn, of Pittsburg. Every one of these stories is without foundation of fact. No deal or fix up has been made with the gentlemen named. It is simply the working of another of the Quay schemes that have grown threadbare.

As the situation stands today Senator Quay is defeated. Although he is not able to give a great deal of his time to his senatorial fight for a week or so, yet his agents are as active as they ever were. The trial of Senator Quay for conspiracy and the use of state funds comes up this week in Philadelphia, and he is looking after that. But had he all of his time his command it would avail him nothing in the next senatorial fight.
