SCENE IN A PORTUGAL WINERY, In the mountains, at the Quinto do Sexie, Portugal, a famous Port Wine district where the custom of treading the grapes for Port Wine is still in vegue. From ten to a dozen men or women for each gang in turn continue the treading, day and night, during the four or five wecks vintage. Some of the treading vats are large enough for three separate rows of ten men each, who with their white breeches well tucked up, their arms on each other's shoulders, raise and tread their feet alternately, with song and shouts to keep the lazier ones up to the work, and a band with string instruments enlivens the hours.
