QUAY AGAIN SUFFERS DEFEAT

He Will Fall Twenty-five Votes Short on Joint Ballot in the Legislature.

MACHINE CLAIMS DO NOT HOLD. What Both Quay and Insurgent Leaders Say About the Result.

A RE-ELECTION IS IMPOSSIBLE. Where the Machine Suffered Defeat, Lebanon County Turns Down its Candidates—Edelman Wins in Bradford—Quay Has Lost Votes This Time Than He Had Before.

Harrisburg, Nov. 15.—The election in the Pennsylvania legislature today resulted, and ex-Senator M. S. Quay is again defeated. The returns from all the counties in Pennsylvania are in, and the result shows just what was predicted prior to the election, that the friends of Senator Quay and his Republican machine in Pennsylvania can organize neither the house nor the senate in its own interests.

THE ELECTION'S RESULT. A careful review of the result in the state has been prepared by the Republican party, and the figures of the majority against Quay are as follows: SENATE: Republican 22, Democrat 13, Doubtful 2.

HOUSE: Republican 43, Democrat 49, Doubtful 4. ON JOINT BALLOT: Republican 143, Democrat 105. Majority against Quay 38.

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COMING COUNTY INSTITUTE. An Elaborate Program Prepared for Entertainment of the Pedagogues—Statistical Statement.

The Forty-fourth annual session of the Somerset County Teachers' Institute will be held in the Court house at Somerset, the week of November 25-30. The opening session will begin Monday, Nov. 25, at 1:30 p. m.

The evening entertainments are as follows: Monday evening, lecture on "Citizenship," by Hon. G. A. Gearhart, of Buffalo, N. Y.

Following the precedent, instituted one year ago, says Supt. Pritts in his institute program, the general public will be required to pay an admission fee of five cents for each half day session.

The Superintendent urges the teachers to be present at all the sessions of the institute, both day and evening, inasmuch as they receive pay for the time in attendance to meet expenses, and declares that the teacher who absents himself from any of the sessions of the institute fails in his duty to himself and to the directors who have employed him.
