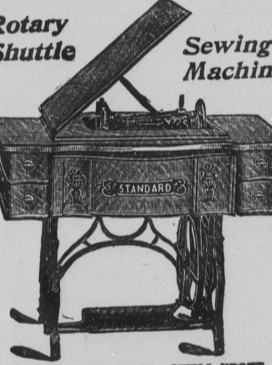

Book 200 Years Old.

Perhaps the oldest book in Windber, if not in this section of the state, is a German Psalter in the possession of Rev. H. A. Buffington. The volume is pocket size, and although it was printed in 1699, is remarkably well preserved. The book contains the Psalms many of them being set to music; also a number of prayer forms, the entire book being printed in German, bearing the imprint of Henry Whetstone, Strausburg, Germany. Rev. Buffington's brother had purchased the ancient publication at a sale of household goods, some twenty years ago, with a lot of other old books, but did not recognize his treasure until some time after.—Windber Era.
