Mr. Demming has been requested to prepare an article for the "Engineering and Mining Journal," of New York, on the bituminous coal industry of Pennsylvania, and has selected the Quemahoning mine of the Merchants Coal Company, at Boswell, as the subject of his description of a model Pennsylvania bituminous coal mine. Mr. Demming is regarded as one of the best authorities on geology in the country, and was selected by the United States War Department to make an extended examination and report on the geological conditions in the Philippine Islands, but the demands of his private practice compelled him to refuse the assignment, says the Somerset Herald.
