LOOKS CROOKED AND DIRTY.

The Salisbury School Board Accused of Unfair Proceedings.

Several weeks ago the Salisbury school board advertised for bids for a janitor, and, as a result, about a half-dozen bids were received from persons anxious to secure the position. When the time arrived to examine the bids, it was found that three of the bidders had handed in the same figures, and the next thing the public knew the matter was readvertised. The only reason given for the readvertising was that three of the bids were a tie.

Ordinarily, a readvertising for bids would have been the proper course to take, but if reports are true (and they seem to be well founded) it was an unfair and dishonest course in this instance.

B. F. Krausse, one of the three tie bidders under the first advertisement, informs us that a vote was taken at the first meeting of the board to select a janitor from the three bidders whose figures were the same, and that as a result of said vote he was declared elected. After he was duly elected, Mr. Krausse informs us that the Secretary of the board protested and announced that he had another bid that was lower than the three tie bids, and for that reason, it is alleged, the Secretary strongly urged a readvertising for a janitor. The proposition was agreed to, and the readvertising was done, which resulted in the hiring of W. H. Boucher.

We have no fault to find with Mr. Boucher as janitor, but if all Mr. Krausse tells us is true, (and certain members of the school board seem to agree with him) then, indeed, Mr. Krausse has been treated dirty and dishonestly. Some of our citizens are urging him to bring suit, and as he claims to be able to prove that he was duly elected janitor at the first meeting, no one can blame him for having that course under consideration. It is dangerous and dirty business to do dishonest advertising, and when a contract is once awarded, it cannot be set aside or ignored with impunity.

However, if these allegations are untrue, the accused directors are welcome to space in THE STAR to set themselves right before the public. But if the allegations are true, those who are guilty are a disgrace to themselves and the office they have been elected to fill with fairness and honesty, and they ought to be taken into court.

The Duties of Our State Banking Commissioner.

Since J. A. Berkey, Esq., of Somerset, has been appointed State Banking Commissioner, we have frequently been asked what the duties of that officer are. His duties are as follows:

To take care that the laws in relation to banks and banking companies, cooperative banking associations, trusts, safe deposit, real estate, mortgage, title insurance, guarantee, surety and indemnity companies, and all other companies of a similar character, savings institutions, savings banks, provident institutions and every other corporation receiving money on deposit, and to mutual savings funds, building and loan associations and bond and investment companies incorporated, or which may hereafter become incorporated, under the laws of this or any other foreign state, and authorized under the laws of this state to transact business herein, shall be faithfully executed; and also that the greatest safety to depositors therein and other interested persons shall be afforded; the Commissioner of Banking and said Department are charged with the supervision of all of said corporations for said purposes.
