The Proprietor of the Meyersdale Republican Sued for Libel.

Calvin M. Ankeny and Clinton C. Wagner have brought criminal and civil actions against Samuel A. Kendall, owner of the Meyersdale Republican, on account of an editorial which appeared in that paper last week, and which Ankeny and Wagner claim has made them suffer in character and in feeling to an amount which exceeds \$5,000.

Both of the plaintiffs are candidates for office on the Orphans' and Citizens' Union tickets, and their suit is generally regarded as a grand-stand play for sympathy and for the votes they would like to have, but can't get. No sensible person believes that the two "cheap skates" who brought the suit have been damaged one cent's worth by the editorial they feel aggrieved over, and the chances are that after the election is over you will hear nothing more of the suit, and very little of the "cheap skates" who brought it.

The editorial complained of was erroneous in one particular at least, viz: That candidates at the last Republican primary in this county were sworn to support the candidates nominated. They were not sworn, as the Republican stated, but they were pledged without an oath, and any truthful man's mere word is generally regarded as good as his oath, and a great deal better than the oath of a liar.

Ankeny and Wagner have violated no oath, as alleged by the Republican, but if they have not violated their pledged word, then we would not know what to call it.

Of course, it is not likely that Mr. Kendall wrote the editorial which Ankeny and Wagner take exceptions to, although, being the owner of the Republican, he is responsible for its contents. The writing was likely done by Mr. Kendall's editor, G. E. Bishop.

If Mr. Kendall has to stand trial, which is not probable, we hope to see him win out. The plaintiffs being only cheap peanut politicians, it is not likely that any twelve sane men in all Somerset county would award them over 6 1/2 cents damage at the most.

Prominent Grantsville Man Attempts Suicide.

J. S. Broadwater, a prominent retired merchant of Grantsville, Md., attempted suicide by shooting himself with a pistol, yesterday afternoon. The ball entered his skull back of one of his ears, lodging somewhere in his brain, but he was still living this morning, and has been conscious at intervals ever since the deed was committed. However, there is no hope for his recovery, and it is only a question of time until death relieves his suffering.

The unfortunate man has been an invalid for a number of years, and on that account he had to abandon his business about five years ago. He suffered intensely at times, and it is believed that his mind was unbalanced when he attempted to take his life. The awful deed was committed in Mr. Broadwater's stable, where the victim was found with his pistol shortly after the shooting took place. Shortly before the deed was done, Mr. Broadwater had made some remarks in the hearing of other members of the family to the effect that a crisis would soon take place, but after the shooting had taken place and he was found with the pistol from which the shot was fired, he expressed surprise and asked who shot him.

The victim of the fatal wound is a son of Wm. C. Broadwater, ("King Billy") one of the wealthiest men of

Garrett county, Md. The father resides in Grantsville, also, and has reached the advanced age of about 95 years. His unfortunate son has a wife and four children. The wife is a daughter of the late Wm. Frost.
