As a consequence the records do not prove that the parties in question ever crossed the matrimonial threshold, but only the fact that a marriage license was issued. The register is powerless to remedy the evil, unless he gets after ministers and justices. Very often he is at a loss to show who the officiating clergyman or magistrate is, and there's the trouble. Since his advent into office, January 1, there are 16 duplicate certificates unheard from. His predecessor, Charles C. Shafer, has over 100 yet to be heard from, says the Berlin Record.
