ROADS DIVIDE TRAFFIC

Interstate Commerce Commission

Interstate Commerce Commission Develops This Fact. That the bituminous coal traffic is divided among six railroad com-panies was developed at the first hearing of the Interstate Commerce commission held in Philadelphia for the purpose of determining whether the railroad companies are interest-ed directly or indirectly in the oll or coal which is transported over their lines. The commission also brought out the fact that by means of the private scar system large mining companies are able to enter into contracts for the delivery of coal at stated periods, while smaller companies who own no such cars are unable to guarantee the eact time when their coal will be delivered. The Pennsvivania railroad, it was learned, declines to handle private cars unless the owner guarantees to have at least 500 cars, the posses-sion of which would involve an out-lary of \$500,000. In this investigation the Inter-state Commerce commission is act-ing under a joint resolution vol Con-gress, approved by President Roose-velt. The resolution was introduced in the United States Senate by Sena-tor B. F. Tillman, and in the House by Representative O. W. Gillespie.

The information that large numbers of Italian anarchists have arrived at San Francisco and Baltimore has re-sulted in the adoption of extreme measures to apprehend these men. Within the past month an Italian was released from prison in San Francisco and upon being questioned openly declared that if he was allow-ed to pursue his course he would kill the President of the United States. He was taken in charge, conveyed to New York and deported to Italy. He would not disclose, however, that he was a member of the organization whose presence here has become known.
