Revision, etc., etc., etc. Some half hundred tables give official and authoritative figures down to the latest possible date. The work of the President and administration is then briefly presented, the condition and status of the Philippines, the Panama Canal, the Navy, Postal Service, Irrigation, etc., etc.

The President's letter to Representative Watson concludes the work, which has a copious index of over a dozen

pages. Scattered throughout the book are quotations from President Roosevelt and other Republican leaders. Among these is the extract from Senator Hanna's speech where he used the "stand na's speech where he used the "stand pat" expression, it being the only in-stance in the Text-Book where the words "stand pat" are used. A page is given to Mr. Bryan and his views, with the comments of the New York World. A so-called "Prosperity Postscript" is added, giving treasury conditions, trade reports, etc., down to August 1.
