Another Street Railway Hearing.

There was a hearing in the case of the Meyersdale & Salisbury Street Railway Co. vs. the Pennsylvania & Maryland Street Railway Co., before Hon. Francis J. Kooser, Judge of the Courts, on Saturday afternoon, on the petition of the plaintiff for an order of the Court to restrain Frank A. Maust from interfering with the corps of engineers which were endeavoring to make a survey of the plaintiff's right of way over land owned by Frank A. Maust and H. H. Maust, which survey was being made in pursuance of a preliminary decree of the Court made in this case, in which the right of the Plaintiff to make the survey was granted.

The answer of Frank A. Maust was to the effect that he was not a party to the suit, but an outside party, and that the Court had no jurisdiction over him, and had no authority to enter the decree as prayed. The Plaintiff met the objection by the allegation that the property in question was owned by Frank A. Maust and H. H. Maust as joint tenants, and that H. H. Maust having signed the answer filed in the case as an officer of the Pennsylvania & Maryland Street Railway Co., and also having assented to an arrangement made in the case by the counsel in open Court that the survey might be made to establish the lines of the Plaintiff's right of way, that his co-tenant, Frank A. Maust, was bound by his action, and estopped from making the defense set up in his answer.

Judge Kooser reserved his decision to some future time, but intimated that if it became necessary for the enlightenment of the Court to have the survey made, that he might grant the right to make it. A. C. Holbert, Harvey M. Berkeley and Koontz & Ogle are the solicitors for the Plaintiff. E. O. Kooser, E. E. Kiernan and Berkey & Shaver are solicitors for the Pennsylvania & Maryland Street Railway Co., and W. H. Ruppel appeared for Frank A. Maust.—Somerset Democrat.
