New Coal Developments. According to some of our exchanges, the following new coal developments are about to be made in this county:

The Reading Coal and Iron Company, which has extensive operations at Kimmelman, on the Somerset & Cambria branch, will shortly open a new slope on the Wingard farm, about a mile from Stoyestown. It is the intention of the company to run enough headings to give employment to 200 miners at the start. A number of houses will be erected there for the accommodation of the miners and their families.

The Quemahoning Coal Company, of which D. B. Zimmerman, of Somerset, is the active head, has also decided to open a new drift several miles from Stoyestown, tapping the same vein that is being worked by the company further up the valley. This operation will also be worked on an extensive scale, and living apartments will be constructed for a large number of miners and their families.
