**HOW JAPS WILL WHIP US.**  
German Military Critic Has Future War Mapped Out.  
Captain Ignaz Rodic, of the general staff of the American-Hungarian army, has published a pamphlet entitled "The Prospects of the Future American-Japanese War," in which he says the unprotected Pacific coast of the United States offers excellent chances of the success of the Japanese.
