Do not peel the peaches; take Do not peel the peaches; take either cling or freestones, cut from the seeds, wash in warm water and cook until soft. When done, rub through a colander or fruit press. Return to the fire in a porcelain lined kettle and add to them sugar to taste; holl down nearly as thek as to taste; boil down nearly as thick as to taste; boil down hearly as thick as wanted, stirring constantly, then add such spices as you like, if any, and finish cooking. Put into small jars while hot, and the top will glaze over as it cools. The skin of the peach adds to the flavor, as well as saving time to the heaventies. time to the housewife.-The Com

Apple and Custard Souffle.

Stew six large apples, sweeten and lavor with lemon peel and nutmeg. When well cooked remove from the stove and reduce to a pulp by whipping with a silver stork; then place this in a large baking dish. Make a custard with the yolks of four eggs, half a pint of cream, sugar and any desired flavoring. When the apples are cool pour over them the custard, then whip the four whites to a stiff froth and put it over the custard, forming an irregular top of little mounds. Over this sift one dessertspoonful of powdered sugar. Put the pudding in the oven and brown lightly.—American Home Monthly.

The Pepper Sandwich.

If you are a sufferer from insomnia, if sleep flies your pillow, and you hear the clock strike one, two, three, growing more and more wakeful between midnight and dawn, try the virtue of a pepper sandwich. It is easily prepared before bedtime, and should stand on a plate within reach of the victim's hand. Cut a thin slice of bread from a previously buttered loaf. Sprinkle it with red pepper, divide it in two, and lay the buttered sides together. Eat it slowly, and moisten the throat with a drink of cold water. The nourishment and stimulus of this sandwich, in nine out of ten cases of insomnia, will induce refreshing sleep.—Christian Herald.

Chicken Chowder.

In the bottom of the pot in which ou expect to make your chowder fry six slices of fat pork crisp, remove and chop into small slices, and return o the pot, with their own fat. Cover his with a layer of chicken, cut up small, a layer of each of potatoes, liced, onions, also sliced, small oyser crackers, tomatoes and some hopped parsley. Alternate these ayers until the pot is three-quarters ull. Pour in enough cold water to over all, and have a kettle of boiling vater ready to replenish the liquid us it boils away. Care is necessary in this matter. Stew gently for an cour. When thoroughly cooked turn into a tureen, adding a cupful of rich milk, and serve very hot, with toasted read. If salt pork is not liked butter may be used instead, being careful that this does not burn. Codfish chowder may be made in the same way, using the fish instead of the chicken.—American Cultivator.
