Butchers should be careful not to let flies crawl over their meats, cleavers, saws, knives, blocks, etc., and dealers in fruits and green groceries should also exercise great care in that direction. A few cents invested in mosquito bar will effectually keep flies from swarming around over fresh meat, boxes of berries and meat market equipments. No one wants to have his meat cut with knives, saws and cleavers covered with fly specks, and there is no occasion to allow scales, blocks and counters to become befouled with them. And who wants to eat strawberries or other fruit to which flies are allowed to have free access? Cleanliness is next to godliness, and to sell only clean food products is godliness itself.

A freak has been born at the Charn Lenen farm, near Garland, that will some of these days blossom forth at the county fairs to astonish the natives and win shekels for its owner. It is a two-headed calf, having three eyes, two sets of nostrils, and other peculiar features. Emil Kleman, 85 Years of Age, Walks 228 Miles in Twelve Days.

On last Tuesday morning there came to Rockwood a man 85 years of age, en route to Connellsville, afoot. The old gentleman presented a very striking appearance with long locks of chestnut brown hair hanging over his shoulders, a weather-beaten, but good, strong face and a very happy disposition. Mr. Emil Kleman made the trip from Baltimore to Rockwood, 228 miles, in twelve days, by following the B. & O. railroad the entire distance. He expected to land in Connellsville on Saturday, July 6, where he intends residing with his daughter. Some two months ago his son-in-law, who was employed in the shops at Cincinnati, Ohio, was thrown out of employment because of a strike then on, in the department in which he worked. Later he secured employment in Connellsville. After procuring what he thought to be sufficient money to move his family, he returned to Cincinnati for the purpose of shipping his goods and removing his family to Connellsville. Later he discovered that he had just enough money to take his family and goods through, and to send the old gentleman to Baltimore by rail. Mr. Kleman told the son-in-law to go through, and he would meet him in Connellsville later. That this is a remarkable feat performed by this octogenarian, goes without saying.

The fact that he had walked at the rate of 19 miles a day, and kept it up for that period of time, is a feat which men much younger than this gentleman would consider remarkable. After all the entire matter resolves itself into simple filial devotion, one of the strongest passions of the human soul, and one which has furnished so many examples of heroism and self sacrifice that embellish the pages of history. We hope the old gentleman arrived safely at his destination, and may yet have many years of a happy life with his kin.—Rockwood Leader.

SAN FRANCISCO.

"I am bound, I know not whither. Of course, I am almost certain of the ultimate whither, but am speaking of the more immediate. "I visited the site of San Francisco. It's shocking.
