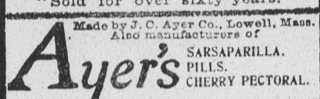

The Maust Lumber Company is building about two miles of standard gauge railroad up Pine run, beginning at the Findlay. The object is to reach a tract of timber owned by the said company and located on the east side of Red Ridge. A mill will be located at the Findlay bridge, where the timber will be converted into lumber. It is estimated that the Red Ridge tract will cut about 2,500,000 feet of lumber.

Dennis Wagner, who had the John J. Engle tract of timber optioned at \$8,000, recently sold the same to the Newman brothers for \$8,500. The tract has considerable good white pine, oak, hemlock and other timber on it, and it is one of the few remaining tracts of virgin forest in the vicinity of Salisbury.
