vin J. Engle at the lever. the locomotive was one built for the
Maust Lumber Company's standardgauge road running from the Findlay
bridge, up Pine Run, to their Red
Rider Ridge timber tract.
The engine was built in the works of the Improved Traction Engine Com-
pany, at Boynton, and it climbed the grade between Boynton and Salısbury without any trouble, which speaks
