"It is with grateful hearts that we note the continued progress throughout the land, in the war against the Liquor traffic.

"Resolved, therefore, that as a conference, we pledge our continued support to this great movement, and that we urge our people to give their hearty endorsement to every movement which has for its aim the overthrow of this gigantic traffic in human souls; and that we will support only those candidates for public office who favor local option."

**IT'S UP TO WEST SALISBURY.**

If the people of West Salisbury want the trolley extended to the bridge at the foot of Ord street, they should make application to become a portion of Salisbury borough, which would be more to their advantage than it would be to those already in the borough, but yet an advantage to all concerned.

We would like to see the people of West Salisbury have street cars to ride on and good pavements to walk on just as soon as they enter the present limits of Salisbury borough. Come on, gentlemen of the West side, let's get together. But don't forget that it's up to West Salisbury to meet us half way in the matter of public improvements for the general good.
