

The school directors' convention is to the director what the annual teachers institute is to the teacher, and the di rector who takes an interest in school work will be there. Under a recent act of Assembly, directors are allowed two dollars a day and mileage at the rate of three cents, so that there can be little excuse from that source for not attending the convention. The teacher is not wholly responsible for the condition of the school. Back of the teacher is the board of directors who, after all, are the court of last resort. With them rests the final decis on whether the schools shall be good or bad, says the Somerset Standard.




