The State Has Wakened Up.

State Fish Commissioner Meehan has instructed his wardens that hereafter sawdust will be considered a "poison" under Section 26 of the Act of 1901, relative to the pollution of streams, and that they shall prosecute all persons who pollute streams with this substance. There is scarcely a district in Pennsylvania which is not more or less affected. Many lumber mills get rid of sawdust by dumping it into streams, and there it kills the fish by choking up their gills. The pity is that this ruling was not made many years sooner, says the Mt. Pleasant Journal.
