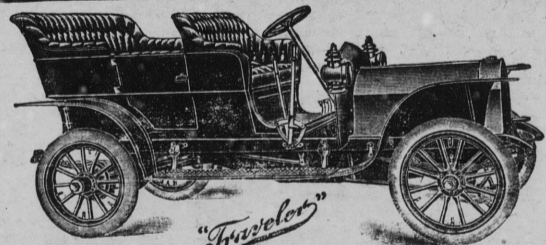

BECAUSE OF THE SLATE. Local Option Meeting Poorly Attended.

The local option meeting held in Hay's opera house, last Thursday night, under the auspices of the Anti-Saloon League, was poorly attended. Thirty-three voters, by actual count, were present, and about twice that many women and children attended. Some of the voters left before the speaking was over, and some showed the great need of closed saloons by coming to the meeting in a grossly intoxicated condition.

The meeting was called to order by John Meager, and the principal speaker was the Rev. C. R. Zanheiser, of Pittsburg, who, while not being much of a speaker, nevertheless brought out some very strong arguments in favor of local option.

The meeting was poorly attended not on account of a lack of temperance sentiment in this community, but because many people suspected that the meeting would be a meeting not so much in the interest of a good cause as in the personal interest of a few candidates that were slated by a committee made up partly of Democrats and Prohibitionists, who have undertaken to force a slate upon the more than 8,000 Republican voters of Somerset county. Many were heard to say that they would attend no meeting held in the interest of a slate set up for Republicans by a combination committee dominated by scheming Democrats and Prohibitionists.

The speaker, however, was careful not to tell the voters in his audience whom they must vote for, but at the close of the meeting a boy stood at the head of the stairway and handed cards to the voters as they passed out, the cards bearing the names of two slated candidates that Democrats and others not members of the Republican party are trying to force upon the G. O. P.

Rev. L. P. Young also addressed the meeting, proclaiming victory in advance of the voting. All right thinking men want to see Local Option candidates win, but the winners will not be candidates which Democrats helped to slate.

Party leaders were not permitted to make slates, this year, and much less will true Republicans support candidates that men outside of their party have helped to slate. The voters demand fair play.
