Bill in Equity Filed.

The Taylor & Saylor Coal Company, a West Virginia corporation, recently filed a bill in equity here to recover the sum of \$6,888 from Samuel D. Livengood, former president of the defunct Farmers' Bank of Meyersdale, and H. M. Berkley, assignee of Mr. Livengood.

The bill sets forth that on Dec. 20, 1903, the defendant represented to the plaintiff company that the title to 637 acres of coal land in Preston county, W. Va., was clear and good, and that as a result the plaintiff company purchased this property for \$20 per acre. It is also alleged that on Aug. 27, 1904, the defendant represented to the plaintiff company that he had secured title to 87 acres of coal property also located in Preston county, and that the plaintiff company purchased the same. The bill sets forth that these representations in both instances were false, and prays that the court order the return of the money.—Somerset Democrat.
