WHEN A MAN TELLS YOU it does not pay to advertise, he is simply admitting that he is conducting a business that is not worth advertising, a business conducted by a man unfit to do business, and a business which should be advertised for sale.

SUPPORT HOME TRADE.

The Cumberland Daily News truthfully says: "If you send your money away from home, does it not occur to you that you are not helping to build up your own community, or make it pay your home storekeeper to stay in business where you live, and where he helps you to pay taxes, but that you are building up some concern in a distant city that has no interest in you or your property?"

Remember that your home merchant accommodates you often by delivering your goods at your door, by extending credit to you when cash is not at hand; he helps to support the schools, churches and other public institutions, including helpless and unfortunate ones in your locality; he is your neighbor, working shoulder to shoulder with you, and helps to increase the value of your own farm or real estate by making your community more active and vigorous.

The tendency for the past few years has been for people to congregate in large cities, and the more the farmer helps to centralize the distribution of goods in large cities, the more he helps to cut down the value of his farm and farm products. It is for the interest of the farmer to have a number of villages, towns and small cities throughout the country, rather than a few large cities. By building up his own community and helping to make it progressive, working shoulder to shoulder with his neighbor, the merchants and local business men, each helping the other, conduces to the best development of the country."

All of the foregoing is very true, and is well worthy to be acted upon. It is good advice to the farmers and others who find the local stores and shops a great convenience to have near their homes. But the store-keepers and shop-keepers of the small towns should not be content with the efforts of the local papers to induce people to deal at home. They should help themselves in every possible way, and there is no better way to do that than by helping those who are willing to help the local stores and shops. The local paper is always a valuable and willing helper to those who appreciate its help. It does more for the good of the community, gratis, than any other agency. It speaks encouragingly of every new industry, and annually gives many lines of free advertising for the advancement of the community where it is published.

Therefore, every local business and professional man, every mechanic and artisan, should help the local paper all he can. They should advertise judiciously and intelligently in its columns, and they should give it their job printing instead of to the printery away from home. When they do otherwise, the publisher and his most ardent supporters will be very apt to retaliate, and they can't be chided for it under such circumstances. When business men are constantly croaking and whining, as some do in every community, about those who patronize the catalogue houses, and then send away from home whenever they want a little printed stationery, they are guilty of the same fault they complain of and condemn in others. And besides, they are the losers by such a course, every time. It does not pay to foster by our own example that which we condemn and dislike in others. Those who set the example of not practicing what they preach in the business world, must not be surprised to see their example followed by others, as a matter of retaliation, if for no other purpose.

The motto of each and every country community should be: "Let us all pull together, in season and out of season, for the general good and prosperity of all, patronizing home people first, whenever practicable." That is the only way to keep any community up to the highest possible notch of prosperity.
