Put one quart of fresh milk, two cups of sugar and the thin yellow rind from two lemons in the double boiler and let it come to a scald. Remove the peel and let the liquid cool. When cold freeze until almost solid enough to remove the beater, then add the juice of four large lemons, or five medium sized ones, mixed with three tablespoonfuls of sugar and the whites of three eggs beaten stiff. Mix thoroughly with the frozen mixture, then cover the freezer, and stir until frozen quite hard. Remove the beater, scrape off the ice, beat and pack closely in the can. Put a cork into the opening in the cover, lay the crosspiece on top to keep the can down in the ice, and cover with an old piece of carpeting wet in salt an old piece of carpeting wet in salt water. Let it stand an hour and serve. If it is to be kept longer, draw off the water and pack with it- more ice and salt.—New York Tele-gram.
