The Legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty four.

There shall be an additional section to the first article of the said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows:

"Src. 26. The Logislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul any charter of incorporation, hereafter conferred, by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporator."
