Death of an Old Resident. Isaac M. Blaker, one of the oldest residents of the town, died at his home on North Bowers street this morning. His age was 60 years, 6 months and 19 days and he had resided in the town since March, 1869. He was born near Newtown, Bucks county, and was in the employ of the Robbins family at this and other places for over thirty years. Death was due to Bright's disease of the kidneys.

His wife and three sons, C. & I. Policeman John W. Blaker and Charles W. and Joseph P. Blaker, survive to mourn his death. Mr. Blaker was a member of Washington Camp, No. 206, P. O. S. of A., and was for a number of years a member of the old local lodge of the Knights of Pythias and settled its affairs when it went out of existence. The funeral will take place on Tuesday, 26th inst., at 2 p. m. Services will be held in the Evangelical church, of which the deceased was a member. The interment will be made in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

THE MULE KILLED.

And the Driver had a Very Narrow Escape. While James Broderick, a driver employed at Indian Ridge colliery, was crossing the railroad track under the breaker this morning a train of light cars, which were being pushed on to the light track, struck and instantly killed the mule and demolished the cart. Broderick escaped injury. The mule was so badly mangled it was difficult to remove its carcass from beneath the derailed cars. The accident was due to the driver's failure to see the approach of the train.

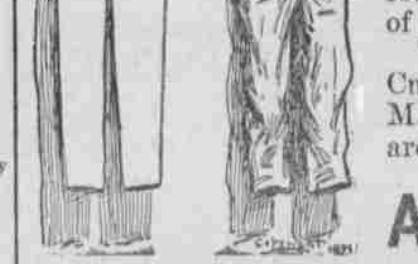
