The Newly-Etected State Officers of Rhode Island Sworn In.

Newscar, R. I., May 27.—A large as-semblage witnessed the organization of the new Legislature. The members of the Seaste were administered the math of office by Secretary of State McGinness. Eugens F. Warner, Republican, of Coventry, was elected Clerk without opposition. In the House the members were also Adfin B. Capron of Smithfield, Republican, was elected Speaker over James L. Brown of Woomsocker, Democrat, by a vote of 52 to 14.

The State officers were then awarn in and the usual proclamation was made in ancient form from the balcony of the State House to the waiting crowds below, while caunou boomed in salute.
