A GRAND CONCERT.

Large Audience in Ferguson's Theatre Last Night.

The concert given in Ferguson's theatre last night was a splendid financial and artistic success. James Sauvage, of New York, was the star of the evening and he sustained the title admirably. His first appearance was a signal for a storm of applause and as he concluded singing "The Noble Boy of Truth" there was such an outburst of enthusiasm that an encore was necessary. His rendition of "Gis La Luna," by Rossini, and the song, "Laughing," by Traberac, were equally well received. Mr. Sauvage's voice has a remarkable range and is of a very pleasing quality. His son, Tonza Sauvage, gave two piano-forte solos with excellent success. His "Recollections of Wales," with several variations, was particularly pleasing. The audience stamped his work with their approval by encoring both his selections. He is certainly an excellent pianist and too much praise cannot be given him. Llew Herbert, of Scranton, shared the honors of the evening. His song "The Skipper," captivated the audience and his success was repeated in the rendition of "Aria of Osmin." Mr. Herbert is one of the finest basses ever heard in the town. Don Cwm-bwria, of Mt. Carmel, pleased the audience very much with his rendition of "My Village Fair" and in the duet "Betty Wynne" with Mr. Herbert he made a hit. The Gwent Glee Society, under his direction, was also very successful. The glee "May Day" and "Whip-poor-will Song" were enthusiastically received. Misses Jennet Bovan and Edith Morgan were warmly applauded for their singing. To omit mention of the Schoppe orchestra would be dropping one of the gems of the concert. The overture and intermission selection were rendered in the most effective manner and the audience was not slow in appreciating the excellent work. In conclusion it may be said that the concert was one of the best musical treats ever given in the town. Edward Reese, of Centralia, was director of the concert and he acquitted himself of the duty with much credit. To properly conduct an entertainment of the kind given last night is not an easy task, but Mr. Reese seemed to be perfectly at home in the work.

BARDSLEY'S CONDITION.

Likely to be Able to Appear at the Hearing To-morrow.

PHILADELPHIA, May 23.—A report to Chief of Detectives Wood by Detectives Miller and Tate and Special Ritchie, who last night watched over Treasurer Bardsley, was a very favorable one. It was stated that Mr. Bardsley passed a very easy night, sleeping from 10 o'clock until 6 this morning, when he awoke feeling very much improved. If Mr. Bardsley keeps on improving, there is but little doubt but that he will be able to be present before Magistrate Pole at noon to-morrow. District-Attorney Graham has issued another warrant for Bardsley's arrest on a charge of perjury in violating his oath of office in using the public moneys for his own gain.

AN UNCLE'S BRUTAL CRIME.

A Village Excited Over an Outrage Committed by an Old Man.
ROSDEN, N. Y., May 23.—The village of Tivoli is in a state of great excitement over an outrage committed by John Cole, aged 60, on his 13-year-old niece, who is in a critical condition, with the chances against her recovery. Cole fled before the expense, leaving his wife penniless, having quietly sold and mortgaged all his property. The victim of the atrocious assault, who is small for her age, says her uncle threatened to kill her if she exposed him. It was not until the child became ill that the facts were brought to light.
