AN ASSASSIN CAUGHT

The Arrest of Degaieff Unearths a Nihilist Plot.

A DETECTIVE'S CLEVER SCHEME

Disguised as a Chimney Sweep He Discovers a Widespread Conspiracy.

Three Pundred Russian Students Arrested hex zar More Frightened Than Ever Ung Oscar Belleved to be Dyingad to Take Action on the Scal Question-London Drivers to Strike.

Sr. Peressure, May 29.—News comes from Kostroma of the arrest of Degaleff, the Nihilist assassin of Col. Soudaikin, whose capture has been reported a dozen times since the murder took place in St. Petersburg eight years ago. Degaieff was believed by many to have scught refuge in the United States, but that does not seem likely to have been the case, judging from the following events. A lively agitation has been carried on by the revolutionists all over South Russia, and a man called Ivanoff was suspected of being the leader. This Ivanoff has been secretary to the Governor of Kostroma for five years.

A detective being set to watch him. was struck with the extraordinary resemblance of Ivanoff to Degaleff, upon whose head a large reward was placed, but, not having sufficient proof to war-rant his arrest, the detective resorted to

Disguising himself as a chimney sweep, he climbed the root of the house in which Ivanhoff losged and descending into his room late at night, suddenly emerged from the stove and presented himself before the astonished inmate, quietly saying: "How do you do, De-gaieft," at the same time presenting a revolver at the secretary, who lost his presence of mind and became pale with

He was quickly handcuffed and upon searching his papers the whole of the conspiracy was discovered.

Many people in Kostroma, students of the various universities, veterinary col-leges, agricultural academies and stu-dents in other schools in Moscow, Odes-sa and Kharkoff to the number of 300 were arrested.

The Nihilist conspiracy now seems to be more active than ever, extending even to the army, of which 40 officers were arrested. The Czar is more frightened than he ever was before.
