A FAMILY FRIGHTENED.

Canned Salmon Stokens Three Children of Town.

The family of Thomas S. Roberts, of East Coal street, received a pretty bad scare yesterday afternoon. Canned salmon was placed on the dinner table and all partook of it quite heartily. The three youngest children, Maggie, aged 11 years, Eddie, aged 8, and Sadie, aged 4, were particularly fond of it. Towards evening the three were suddenly taken very ill.
