CANADA'S CRIMINALS Sent to the United States in Violation of Law.

THEY DRIFT OVER THE BORDER. Europe's Scheme to Avoid Complications With This Country.

Director-General Davis Talks About the World's Fair—There Will be a Display Such as Has Never Been Seen in This World—Investigating the Concord Accident—New Postmasters.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A stricter enforcement of the immigration laws is one of the certainties of the near future.

The Treasury officials are fully in sympathy with the sentiment of the country in this regard, and from this time it will become more and more difficult for undesirable foreigners to find a lodgement in the United States.

Assistant Secretary Nettleton, who has the immediate control of immigration matters, is fully alive to their importance. He has given them careful and intelligent study.

"There is no real machinery of that kind at work now," he said. "We have learned, however, that in many provinces of Europe, or the small towns where undesirable persons have been found—such as idlers, thieves or questionable characters—steps have been quietly taken to provide them with means of deportation to the United States in order to be rid of them."

A more extended and vicious system has recently been brought to our notice by a lady who came to this country as a steerage passenger in order to know something about our immigrants.

A SAD SCENE. Director-General Davis of the World's Fair Suddenly Afflicted.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A very sad scene occurred in Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Nettleton's room during the morning.

He was in the best of humor, when a telegraph messenger boy entered the room with a telegram for Mr. Davis.

Mr. Davis left the department at once and went to the depot and took the train for Boston. Mrs. Davis was over 70 years of age, but her death was sudden, and the shock therefore great.

Director-General Davis has been empowered by the State Department to appoint five commissioners to visit Europe in the interest of the fair, and to have their expenses paid by the government.

Where May Be Considerable Trouble in Settling the Behring Sea Question. WASHINGTON, June 6.—There is a fair prospect for another hitch in the Behring Sea matter before it reaches arbitration.

The bill passed by the House of Commons confers authority upon the Queen to issue a proclamation prohibiting British subjects from taking seals during a certain period, but the issuance of this proclamation is dependent upon the disposition of the Queen—or rather of Lord Salisbury.

The British government, it is understood, will insist that the United States shall be pledged to pay British subjects for losses sustained through the deprivation of sealing privileges during the closed season if the contentions of the United States are not sustained by arbitration.

Investigating the Concord Accident. WASHINGTON, June 6.—A board of officers is to meet at the Norfolk Navy Yard to-day to investigate the circumstances of the death of two men on the United States steamer Concord, by the blowing out of her main steam pipe.

Fourth Class Postmasters. WASHINGTON, June 6.—Fourth class postmasters were appointed in New York State as follows: J. Austin at Cincola, Yates County; F. Price at Paradise, Orange County; and E. W. Place at Wyanadon, Suffolk County.
