SIR JOHN'S FUNERAL.

Thousands Walked in the Procession Today at Kingston.

KINOSTON, Ont., June 11.—The funeral of the late Premier, John A. Macdonald, which took place this afternoon, was the largest ever seen in Canada.

Members of the late Cabinet acted as pallbearers. Thousands walked in the procession and lined the streets.

Sir John Macdonald's will will not be probated until after the funeral. It was drawn up some years ago by the Hon. Mr. Abbott and is understood to contain a wish that Kingston should be his last resting place.

Senator Abbott to be Premier. OTTAWA, June 11.—It is now admitted in all quarters that Senator Abbott is to be the future Premier of Canada.

Two thousand Jews have emigrated from Elizabethgrad, Russia, principally to America within six weeks.

The Bell Telephone directors have declared a regular dividend of 3 per cent, and an extra dividend of 10 per cent.

Freddie Rock, aged 13, of Sandersville, Miss., was killed by an accidental blow on the head with a baseball bat.

The annual report of the Board of Assessors of Boston shows that the total valuation of that city as taxed, was \$222,431,500.

The International Typographical Union in session at Boston adopted resolutions favoring the Governmental control of telegraphs.

Two hundred hands in Robert Adams' cotton mill at Birmingham, Conn., have struck because of a reduction of 40 per cent in their wages.

Domino Phillip, murderer of his sister-in-law, Govani Dionora, at Cedar Brook, N. J., was sentenced to 20 years in State prison.

At Camden, N. J., William, alias "Razor," Mount, who killed Leonard Wolcott on April 14, was sentenced to 10 years in State prison.

Many schools and colleges held graduation exercises, and among the principal ones were Columbia Law School, Princeton and Vassar.

It seems that the hot weather has produced an epidemic of suicides, as there were three successful cases and one attempt in New York yesterday.

The sale of intoxicating liquors in Cambridge, Mass., is now absolutely prohibited, the board of Aldermen having voted to even refuse licenses to druggists.

The Right Rev. John Egan, Roman Catholic Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Ireland, is dead. He had been suffering for some time past with influenza.

A woman who gave the name of Beatrice Collins, of New York, was arrested at Reading, Pa., for passing counterfeit dollars. On her person was found a dozen counterfeit dollars and about \$63 in good money.

Billy McMillan, the well-known Washington pugilist, and Tom Ryan, the Chicago welter-weight champion, have been matched to fight to a finish on August 5 next, for a purse of \$750 and the gate receipts.

A western ranchman named Fratzer Gilman, who formerly lived in Waterville, Me., has forwarded a letter to the Governor of Maine demanding the portrait of William King, the first Governor of that State, which for 30 years has been hanging in the State House at Augusta. He says the picture was to the State by his wife in 1850.
